Sermon Study Guide

(Reminder: The purpose of the questions is to explore the text and themes of the sermon. Do not feel a need to go through all of the questions, but try to discuss/study some in each category. The goal is to stimulate discussion/reflection and transformation related to the sermon text and themes.)

- 1. What evidences of grace have you seen since we last met?
- 2. What were the Songs of Ascent? What was the purpose of God's people going to Jerusalem? (Deut. 12:5-7) The first Song of Ascent was a lament. Why might a lament be part of the preparation to rejoice?
- 3. Christians are exiles in this world, it is not our home. (Read 1 Pet. 1:1; 2:11; Heb. 11:13) What does this mean? How does it related to Ps. 120:5-7? Talk about the statement just under the 3rd bullet point on the Listening Guide.
- 4. What stuck out to you from the sermon Sunday?
- 5. What themes do you find helpful or interesting?
- 6. What sin did the Holy Spirit convict you of in this sermon?
- 7. How were you encouraged by this passage?
- 8. How does this passage connect to or inform our understanding of the gospel?
